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## Design Plan



### Name of Project

Prompts for Restructuring Oral Muscular Phonetic Targets (PROMPT) Training for a New Communication Disorder Assistant (CDA)

### Description

- Real learning request to train a new individual on the routines relating to the daily care of an adult client with special needs
- The new individual will be trained by a previous CDA who has known the family for 4-5 years, 2 years working
- Training from the previous CDA will occur over a 4-8 day period in total during the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> week of employment and in the client's home
- PROMPT activities are a key requirement as they indicate the client's oral communication level and equip the CDA with tools to assist the client
- Previous CDA is planning to schedule follow-up meetings after training

### Audience Analysis/Learner Profile

- Primary: The new CDA
  - Has a relevant degree and 3 years experience assisting people with special needs
  - 6 months experience assisting with Speech Language Pathology goals through work which ended approximately 1 year ago
    - Will have some additional guidance from clinic staff during client's appointments
- Secondary: The client's family and other staff, potential for further training or review of materials

## Trainer Requirements

The trainer must possess:

- Know the client and their sound levels
- Background in phonetics and PROMPT

## Goal of the Learning

- Accurately use PROMPT to aid the client's speech development and identify known sound substitutes when appropriate

## Performance Objectives

- Performance Objective #1: Explain the tactile cues and the three support components that contribute to sound formation
- Performance Objective #2: Use the correct tactile cues to support the components that contribute to sound formation
- Performance Objective #3: Identify potential sound substitutions to aid in word development

## Learning Objectives

- Learning Objective #1: Given a list of sounds, the learner will explain each PROMPT, such that the three components of sound formation are identified with 100% accuracy
- Learning Objective #2: Given the trainer's head, the learner will demonstrate PROMPT such that, the correct finger placements, timing, and pressure of the tactile cues are used 100% of the time
- Learning Objective #3: Given 10 words, the Communication Binder, and a template, the learner will propose a word development plan such that, only words containing sounds the client is struggling with/has not achieved are modified, and that these substituted sounds best match the desired sound in terms of the three components of sound formation

**Design Channels/Modalities & Rationale**

Learning will be blended and modular, offering self-study or asynchronous opportunities when appropriate.

## Requirements & Implementation Strategies

- Training will be self-directed e-learning (Asynchronous – Unit 1) and in the client's house (Synchronous – Unit 2&3)
- Additional materials include:
  - Training
    - Unit 1: PROMPT Handbook
    - Unit 2: A notebook and pens or a recording device
    - Unit 3: Template for a Word Development Plan, the Communication Binder, and a notebook and pens or a recording device
  - Job Aids
    - General: The resources/tools provided for each unit will be kept by the learner
    - Unit 1: No additional job aid
    - Unit 2: Email with links to videos of people demonstrating PROMPT
    - Unit 3: Job aid project (Word Development and Sound Substitution Guide) and Phonetics Diagram
- Costs will be minimal due to the materials needed and individual training:
  - Cost of printing materials and supplying a notebook and pens or a recording device
  - Hourly wage for previous CDA (trainer) and new CDA (learner)
    - Client will work on other communication goals that are fairly autonomous, no additional person required
  - Material for the e-learning will be pulled from reputable sources, no additional cost

## Evaluation Strategy

- Level 1: Reaction survey to be completed following PROMPT Training and before debrief, through a paper document provided by the trainer
- Level 2: A physical demonstration of PROMPT cues for approximately 10 words and an oral test consisting of approximately 30 questions (~10 per LO), facilitated by the trainer during the next working day
- Level 3: Interviews with the client's family and program/clinic staff, review test of PROMPT for sounds and words, and 20-40 minute coaching sessions with the trainer 1 week and 1, 3, and 6 months following the learning event

### Course Title

Unit 3: Substituting Sounds for Word Development

### Description

- One-on-one training with one trainer and one learner
  - Trainer – Previous Communication Disorder Assistant (CDA)
  - Learner – New CDA

### Logistics

- Unit 3 will be provided in the client’s home at times typically scheduled for PROMPT review with the client
- To accommodate training, the client will focus on different, and relatively autonomous, communication goals
  - Ex. creating stories with an iPad app

**Learning Objective**

Given 10 words, the Communication Binder, and a template, the learner will propose a word development plan such that, only words containing sounds the client is struggling with/has not achieved are modified, and that these substituted sounds best match the desired sound in terms of the three components of sound formation

**Supporting Objectives**

At the end of this unit the trainee will be able to:

- Explain how words are developed
- Analyze the similarities and differences between sounds
- Select appropriate sound substitutions for the client
- Create a plan for word development using sound substitutions and PROMPT theory

**Lesson Outline**

This unit will follow the 3 Part Learning Model

- Before
  - Facilitate a conversation to encourage the learner to consider how words are formed, the components of sounds, what they would do when the client doesn't have a required sound for a word, and why
- During
  - Have the learner complete a Draft Plan for the development of 10 words
    - Provide a template and the Communication Binder
- After
  - Have the learner explain their Draft Plan and reasoning to you
  - Discuss the key concept of sound substitution with the learner and have them record notes for their job aid assignment

**Evaluation Plan**

Comprising of a formative and two summative assessments:

- 30% – Formative
  - Draft Plan for the development of 10 words
- 70% – Summative
  - 30% – Job Aid (Word Development and Sound Substitution Guide)
  - 40% – Oral test with approximately 10 words (half from this activity and half new)

**Rationale**

Following the 3 Part Learning Model allows the learner to discover knowledge through exploring, connecting, and practicing. This format also gives the learner multiple opportunities for feedback, aiding their retention. The final step includes the construction of a job aid after reflecting on their solution to the “case study”. Creating the aid in this manner also benefits their retention and supports the transfer of knowledge. The oral test will measure both their retention and their application to new situations. Overall, this model best reflects the real-world situation, where the learner will need to continuously use their knowledge to select best-fit solutions (often on the spot), evaluate their effectiveness, and revisit their strategies.

### **Course Title**

Unit 3: Substituting Sounds for Word Development

### **Learning Objective**

Given 10 words, the Communication Binder, and a template,

The learner will propose a word development plan

Such that, only words containing sounds the client is struggling with/has not achieved are modified,

And that these substituted sounds best match the desired sound in terms of the 3 components of sound formation

## Lesson Plan

### Icebreaker (3-5) min):

Have the learner say the following sentence without the letters “C”, “K”, and “G”, but without dropping letters:

- Kelly the pig went to the market to buy cakes and grapes

(Ex. Without “K” and “L” Kelley could be Wewy)

Ask the learner:

- How hard was it to figure out how to communicate that to me? To fill in the gaps?
  - How did you feel? Were you Frustrated?

Learner will:

- Participate by attempting to say the sentence
- Reflect on the challenges

Trainer will:

- Encourage the learner to figure out a solution
- Be patient while the learner decides how to communicate it



### Before (5-10 min):

Facilitate a discussion by asking the learner:

- How would you assist the client in forming words?
  - How are words formed? And components of that?
- What if they don't have a required sound?
  - What needs to be considered when substituting sounds?

Revisit the importance of substituting sounds before continuing

Provide “Soap” as an example and get learner to propose why

Learner will:

- Participate in the discussion
- Pull from previous units to connect concepts

Trainer will:

- Create a safe space
- Encourage learner to ask questions
- Clarify and redirect through questions



**During (20-30 min):**

Provide 10 words, the Communication Binder, and the template

Ask the learner to use the template to create a draft plan for the client's word development

Remind them to explain their decisions for each word

Learner will:

- Complete the Draft Plan to the best of their abilities
- Ask for clarification or ask questions when needed

Trainer will:

- Clarify and redirect through questions
- Observe and assess



**After (10-15 min):**

Have the learner share their plan and explain their decisions

Assist the learner in summarizing key concepts, such as:

- What are the components of sound formation?
  - How should these be considered?
- Specific examples of correct and incorrect substitutions

Introduce the take-home Job Aid Assignment and upcoming test

Learner will:

- Fully explain their choices
- Respond to feedback
- Participate in discussion and record notes

Trainer will:

- Encourage note taking
- Clarify misunderstandings and provide feedback
- Ask probing questions to facilitate review
- Provide assignment rubric and explain test style

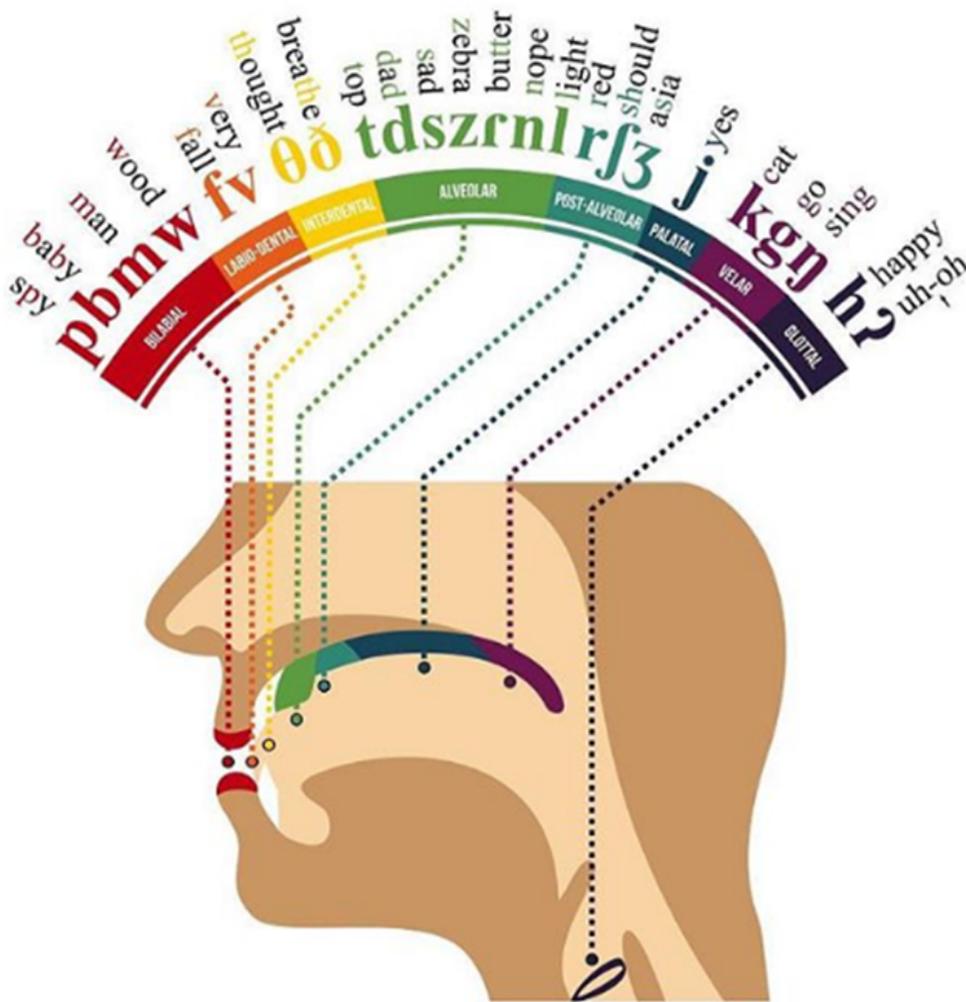
